Rail~Volution is a national movement: It is a transformation in the way we live, led by people from all perspectives dedicated to creating healthy, economically vibrant, socially equitable and environmentally sustainable communities with transit.

Rail~Volution is an event, a network and an organization: Since 1995, it has been a driving force in the livability movement. Every year, people come together in a transit-rich community to participate in workshops, charrettes, networking events and toolbox sessions: Last year in Washington, DC, more than 1,100 people attended. The event invigorates the network of committed individuals who continue to strategize and communicate year-round. And each year this organization builds on its success to increase its impact on the future of building livable communities through transit.

Rail~Volution 2012 is in Los Angeles, California: Long before Los Angeles was known for its car culture, the city blossomed around its public transit. Today, traffic may be gridlocked, but investment in transportation is not. The region provides a showcase of transportation choices and challenges applicable to communities across the nation: fully integrated bus and core rail systems; communities rekindled by transit-oriented design; and a county funding measure that passed overwhelmingly to allow Metro to nearly double its existing rail and rapid transit system -- condensing 30 years of growth into the next 10. All create a more vibrant and sustainable economy. Los Angeles' diversity, both in terms of demographics and types of communities being transformed, provides a glimpse into the future for other US regions and cities of all sizes. The national debate is challenging transit, once again, but communities across the country are making their own investments in transit and livable communities as recipes for economic success. This is a critical time, and Rail~Volution 2012 will be a great place to showcase new ideas and promising practices.

Rail~Volution 2012 is seeking speakers: We want the people who will lead the movement -- people who can best share the stories that will educate, provoke, and inspire conference attendees through toolbox sessions, panel presentations, and workshops. We are calling on a wide range of speakers with a variety of experiences and backgrounds, whose work magnifies our mission of building livable communities with transit.

If you are one of those people, we want to hear from you.

Call Details: This year we are focusing on three categories for more than 60 sessions: Rail~Volution Fundamentals, In-Depth Topics and New Ideas. We are seeking speakers representing a broad array of private firms, public agencies, and non-profits from disciplines ranging from transit and development to advocacy and government. We encourage speakers from a wide range of geographic, ethnic and diverse community backgrounds.

#1 Rail~Volution Fundamentals

These sessions cover topics that conference participants need to understand to work effectively on building livable communities with transit. We are seeking speakers who are experts in their fields and can describe principles, tools and processes to a non-expert audience. You can support your ideas with examples, case studies, and projects, but the emphasis of the presentation should be on concepts. Speakers should seek to ignite interest and increase understanding for people who are new to livability issues or are looking for information about a new topic. Examples of topics:

#2 In-Depth Topics

Rail~Volution has always been a place where people who are passionate about creating livable communities come together to share experiences, swap lessons learned and discuss controversial ideas. We are interested in speakers who can bring in-depth examples to life – crafting them into useful, meaningful lessons. These sessions delve deep into the subject matter. Rail~Volution is the place to float new ideas and approaches. Areas such as sustainability and livability are topics that are constantly evolving with new challenges, legislation and technologies. We are interested in proposals that address urgent and timely topics, such as job creation, energy, the economy and new funding strategies, plus we want to look at the next problems we need to solve. These proposals should be broad enough to allow different perspectives and discussion, but not too broad that they lose focus on the Rail~Volution mission.

New Workshop Formats

Rail~Volution is always exploring fresh ways to get information to our participants. In addition to traditional formats such as panels and "talk show" sessions, we hope to introduce new interactive presentation formats during this year's conference. Workshop coordinators will suggest and guide invited proposers in determining the best format for their presentation as part of preparation for the conference.

Selection Process

Rail~Volution speakers are leading visionaries and practitioners as well as emerging professionals with fresh ideas and experiences in the field. The selection process is highly competitive, based on experience, presentation abilities and, especially, relevance to a wide range of topics supporting our mission: building livable communities with transit. In the past, fewer than half of the proposers were selected to speak.

After the deadline, all proposals will be reviewed by Rail~Volution's National Steering Committee, made up of professionals from around the country representing multiple perspectives. The review will address relevance and fit with the conference's intended theme and content for the year.

Rail~Volution is a nonprofit organization and all presenters must pay for their own travel and hotel expenses. For their efforts, presenters receive complimentary registration for the day that they speak <u>or</u> a reduced registration of \$350 for the whole conference. This benefit does not include sessions with additional costs, such as mobile workshops or charrettes.

We thank you for your proposal, interest and commitment and look forward to seeing you at this year's conference, either as a speaker or as an attendee.
